Key Themes from Engagement Nights

- Equitable access to programs (for example French Immersion in the Elk Valley)

- Increase in outdoor learning
- Reduced screen time/movie days especially when there are unqualified TTOCs covering
- Information sharing How does the district do compared to the rest of the province (graduation rates and in post secondary)
- Before and after school care options for families
- Balancing rigour and social emotional learning
- Understanding the new reporting order (Kindergarten to Grade 9)

- Amazing bus drivers




What attributes does the school district have that you appreciate most?

- Youth Train in Trades access/dual credit for the Elk Valley
- More Educational Assistants

- More mental health support for students

- Increase administration time for larger student populations
- A living wage for CUPE employees (Educational Assistants)

- Board meetings in all communities



- Higher Expectations (currently are low... be honest as to how our kids are doing.) (everything is always so positive)
- Transparency in budgeting
- A wide variety of learning experiences
- Provide real life training ditch the everyone wins mentally, this is not real life kids need to learn how to cope with disappointment
- Include TTOCs in district emails and pro d events and social events
- Jobs should go to the best candidate not by seniority (teaching)
