2. PRESENTATIONS

2.1 School Growth Plan – Parkland Middle School

Scott Holt presented Parkland Middle School's Growth Plan. Highlights included:

- Included teachers in discussion; very powerful
- Who are we? What do we Know? Dreams? Action Plan, Support Structures and Communication were major themes along with supporting all learners
- Continue innovative pedagogical practices
- · Focus on differentiated learning
- Celebrating success more of a school spirit model
- Community night for parents see works of students' displays in the spring
- Number of teachers feel supported to branch into different areas of passions
- Supporting transition from elementary to middle to high school
- Initiatives to support at-risk learners
- Collaboration and inquiry teams
- Innovation and community give students opportunity to communicate to each other without texting
- Focusing on aboriginal content in curriculum
- Student self-assessment focus; school-wide informal report card (interim reports)

2.2 School Growth Plan – Highlands Elementary School

Steve Rogers presented Highlands Elementary School's Growth Plan. Highlights included:

- focus on Aboriginal learning
- PAC very involved in school's focus
- Student led initiatives around school
- Spiral of inquiry approach as a staff they are asking what is going on for their learners? What are successes and challenges?
- Working on those students who are not yet meeting or approaching in their rubrics for numeracy literacy and social responsibility
- Personal identity working on helping students feel valued
- How are we looking at embedding all aboriginal components through all parts of curriculum in authentic and meaningful ways?
- Finding out what local cultural resources are available
- Staff want to work on 3 things: new curriculum, MyEducationBC; Numeracy
- Staff feel that they need to move forward and become better educated in how to develop a students' understanding of their ethnicity and how to integrate more of the First Nation curriculum in all of our curriculum strands; - involve aboriginal education support workers, Joe Pierre and the Elders
- Looking at professional development funds and projects to support goals
- Library will have aboriginal education resource center

Comments/Questions:

- Enables all students to have different viewpoint as well as understand aboriginal viewpoint and their contribution in terms of Canadian history
- Is staff and students experiencing the aboriginal space at the college?
- Intent to have as many parents' input as possible on school growth plan

Continual focus on student safety in many facets

- Very big time commitment for Mike Kelly and Gail Rousseau
- need to make it easier for the students to participate
- students need to be part of the new curriculum discussions
- · Lots of logistics issues need to be sorted out
- include them in discussions about policy and the newly designed curriculum
- suggestion to revisit idea of student trustee on board committees

- use wide-angle camera for Webex communication

5.1 Draft Policy Advertising

Feedback from partner groups was reviewed. Discussion included:

- advertising policy vs sponsorship/partnership policies
- options for recognizing sponsorships/partnerships (i.e. on website) vs logos printed on sport uniforms, time clocks, etc.
- shopping days/evenings in schools
- community events advertised in school newsletters/emails
- BC School Sports currently has a ban on businesses advertising on school
 uniforms, which is different than a business buying schools uniforms and putting
 their logo on them as that is then a sponsorship, not advertising
- sponsorship/partnership policies are still in development and are completely separate from the advertising policy
- need to find respectful ways to acknowledge sponsorships/partnerships without it becoming too commercial.

Recommendation A

5.2 Draft Policy – Social Media

Feedback from partner groups was reviewed. Discussion included:

- How do we enforce accountability?
- policy is a starting point the best we can do is to set policy, provide training to educate and inform people so they understand it
- training includes educating staff on changing their passwords regularly, especially when taking laptops home
- extreme caution should be used when expressing any type of personal opinions/views regarding school district business on social media.

Recommendation B

DRAFT POLICY ADVERTISING

SECTION

Schools, as educational institutions with a "captive" clientele, must not become vehicles for the circulation of materials intended primarily for commercial gain, nor for exploitation of students and their families by commercial, political, religious, cultural or other non-school interests. - 4. District ICT and technology services are the property of the School District and are subject to provisions under the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act.
- 5. Non-work related use of District ICT and technology services must not interfere with the performance of an employee's employment responsibilities.
- 6. The use of District ICT and technology services during non-scheduled hours of work for personal reasons must be in accordance with these Regulations and must not incur additional cost to the School District, whether through the consumption of computer cycles, labour costs, printers, paper, storage media or other resources.
- 7. District ICT and technology services use may be monitored without warning and inappropriate usage may be cause for cancellation of privileges and/or disciplinary action up to and including dismissal.
- 8. All employees, including trustees, are responsible to ensure they have reviewed these Regulations prior to making use of School District ICT and technology services.

STUDENT ACCEPTABLE USE OF INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY (ICT) AND TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

SECTION 7.1Rb

- 1. It is the responsibility of all students using the District's ICT and technology services to keep their passwords confidential to protect themselves, their data and School District data. Accounts or personal information must never be shared or distributed to others.
- 2. Students must never use another person's accounts.
- 3. District ICT and technology services must be used in a legal, ethical, responsible and educational manner. (For example, distributing obscene, abusive, racist, threatening, unsolicited e-mail messages, or sexual, harassing and/or bullying messages or material is unacceptable).
- 4. Parental written consent is required for students to access District ICT and technology services.
- 5. Students will be given access to District ICT and technology services once they have signed an ICT Student Use Agreement and are aware of the Student Code of Conduct.
- 6. Failure to comply with these Regulations may result in disciplinary action up to and including suspension.

Illegal acts committed on or through district electronic communications systems may be reported to legal authorities. Illegal acts may include but not be restricted to hacking into systems or deleting files to which the student does not have access privileges, introducing viruses or downloading or copying copyrighted material.

Expectations for Students Using Information and Communication Technology

The following are expectations for students accessing District ICT:

Inappropriate material: I will inform school staff if I come across any site, material information or situations that make me feel uneasy or uncomfortable, or that I believe may contain inappropriate material. I will not respond to a message sent to me that makes me feel uneasy or uncomfortable. I will not post, send or download inappropriate material.

Respect for other people's personal information: I will not post personal information about other people. Personal information may include, but not limited to, full names, school locations, interests, extracurricular activities, occupations, home or business addresses or phone numbers.

Posting student's own information: I will not post my personal information anywhere, including my homepage, if I have one, through District ICT. I may however post school projects and work as approved by my teacher.

School and District Code of Conduct apply: As a student, I understand that all of the rules of expected conduct, appropriate language, fair and respectful comments and responsible behaviour of a School District 5 student and the consequences for breaking those rules apply to my use of District ICT. I agree that:

- I will not do anything illegal;
- I will not breach my responsibilities as a student under the Student Acceptable Use of District ICT;
- I will not break any regulations regarding student conduct established by the District or my school;
- I will use appropriate language and any statements of opinion that I make will be respectful, fair and not malicious;
- I will not engage in any financial transactions;
- I will not cause any damage or losses to any person or equipment in using District ICT.

Responsible Use of the Resources: I agree to use my time effectively, in posting and using services such as browsing and downloading files. I agree to keep my password secret.

Plagiarism: I agree that I will not copy information and claim it as my own.

Copyright: In the event that I wish to copy any copyrighted work, if I do not already have legal permission to copy that work, I will ask the original author for written permission to use the graphics or any copyrighted works, including, but not limited to, works of art, compositions, text, symbols, sayings, cartoons, excerpts, and quotations. SECTION 7.1

ACCEPTABLE USE OF INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY (ICT) AND TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

The Board of Education believes in the benefits that ICT can bring to support teaching, learning and daily operating activities. District ICT and technology services supplied by the Board of Education will be used in an appropriate manner. This includes, but is not limited to computers, laptops, tablets, personal digital assistants and other personal technologies, use of the internet, intranet and electronic based services, in essence, any device whether it be District-supplied or personal that connects to the District's network. All School Board staff, students, trustees, parents, school councils and other select individuals who are given access to the District ICT and technology services are required to know and abide by this Policy in order to ensure that District ICT is being used in a safe and responsible manner. The use of personal devices on non-District networks, when used in the school learning environment, is also subject to this Policy and Regulations.

All users are responsible for ensuring that they use the District ICT resources in an appropriate manner in accordance with School Board Policies and procedures. School District ICT and technology services must be utilized in a legal, ethical, responsible and professional manner consistent with the educational, informational and recreational purposes for which they are provided. Access to District ICT resources is a privilege, not a right, and may be withdrawn if individuals do not comply with the School Board's Policy and Regulations governing the acceptable use of District ICT.

DRAFT POLICY

SOCIAL MEDIA USE

SECTION

The Board of Education welcomes the responsible use of social media technologies and other forms of electronic communication to support learning and for School District business and communication purposes. This Policy and Regulations have been developed to provide all employees, as well as Trustees, with guidelines to understand the impact of social media and electronic communication and their appropriate uses in order to ensure professional communication standards and to mitigate both the School District's employees', as well as Trustees', exposure to risk.

The Board of Education recognizes the open nature of social media which is often used for both personal and professional purposes. However, professionalism remains of utmost importance. It may not always be clear when one is speaking on behalf of the District, sharing facts, or sharing personal/professional opinions. It is important to remember that we are subject to the same laws, policies, and expectations when interacting online as we would in-person.

This Policy is designed to clarify all employees', as well as Trustees', responsibilities when posting material online and exchanging electronic communications with students, parents and coworkers. This Policy and its Regulations apply to social media use and other electronic communications by all employees, as well as Trustees, whether during the work day or at other times, on the District network or from outside the District network and on District devices or personal devices. All employees, as well as Trustees, should be aware that there is not an expectation of privacy in social media use and electronic communications. Social media and electronic communications are subject to review by the Board of Education as reasonably required, including to investigate complaints of inappropriate use. Breach of this Policy and Regulations may result in disciplinary action up to and including termination.

Planning for the K - 12 Renewed/Revised Curriculum

We are currently in the process of planning for our implementation of the renewed/revised curriculum with a particular focus on the K – 9 section as the full implementation begins next September. We held an initial planning session with Diane Casault, Jason Tichauer, Erin Hay, Shelley Balfour and Christina Smith (co-presidents CFTA) and Carol Johns, Colette Grasdal, Janet Kuijt and Patrice Oscienny (co-chairs of the Professional Development Committee). A second planning session is planned for December 9th with this group to finalize work for our larger committee that will involve teacher representatives from all schools along with administrator representatives on January 7th. This larger group will be instrumental in organizing the two additional Non-Instructional days for our entire district all focused on implementation. In my visits around the district, there is already a great deal of work that has already happened in preparation for full implementation. An exciting time in the history of BC Education!

Successful Growing Innovation Grants

Last week, Diane Casault and I attended the Provincial Rural Advisory Committee Meeting and were very happy to report about our TWO successful applicants for a Growing Innovation Grant.

Sparwood Secondary has received a subsequent grant to continue their work creating an interdisciplinary event designed to foster community across the student body while achieving learning outcomes in creative ways. On my recent visit there, it was evident that this year's Medieval May celebration will be the culminating activity in a year-long project that already incorporates many aspects of the newly revised/renewed curriculum. Students are fully engaged in a variety of activities across the subject areas in preparation for the celebratory event. This year's fair hopes to draw in more community and elementary school participation.

The second project is a new application entitled: The Rocky Mountain Elementary and Elkford Secondary School Greenhouse Project. Students at the two schools will collaborate in creating and maintaining a greenhouse and garden and will be investigating how students come to engage healthy food choices, how school culture transforms and how relations amongst the schools improve as the result. Of particular interest will be the inclusion of learning more about indigenous ways of utilizing local plants.

Connecting with Local Seniors Initiative at Sparwood Secondary School

This school's Spartans Leadership group is busy preparing an exciting initiative that partners with Lilac Terrace and other seniors from the community of Sparwood. Plans are underway to create a dinner and games night this spring in which the student leaders will serve dinner and play games with seniors from the community. The students will also engage in inquiry about the history of Sparwood from the seniors. The goal of the project is to engage student leaders to work creatively with local seniors. The group is already fundraising to pay for the dinner, planning the agenda and menu and collaborating with Deborah Friesen from Lilac Terrace. The students are also planning on collaborating with other students to create a documentary of the evening. What a great example of student leadership in action!

British Columbia School Superintendent's Conference

At the BCSSA Conference in November, our school district was selected to present not one but TWO break-out sessions to the attendees. We had two great examples linking to environmental or placebased/consciousness learning that were also excellent examples of the revised BC Curriculum. I had the honour of introducing both projects. On the first day the SD 5 presentation was by Karen Deibert from Parkland Middle School and Michelle Sartorel from Gordon Terrace Elementary School who shared "Engaging and Leading 21st Century Learners through the Arts". This program involved Karen working with students and teachers from elementary feeder schools showing the value of learning through the arts that connects students' learning to their core subjects and core competencies. Karen and Michelle shared amazing examples of how students have an opportunity to gain knowledge and work in multiple intelligences thereby gaining greater understanding of their own personal learning strengths and styles. The second presentation ("The KNOOK Project: Connected to Nature in a Digital World" by Mardelle Sauerborn and Christine McKie of Frank J Mitchell Elementary School) shared how this project started in Mardelle's kindergarten room is spreading throughout the school and community. This is an ongoing inquiry, focusing on re-imagining student access to learning in outdoor spaces. Embedded in this project is an exploration of the role technology plays in providing students with powerful tools and platforms from which they can articulate and transform their personal learning. Both teams absolutely knocked it out of the park!

The writing team for the new Enhancement Agreement is well under way! The group has met four times and is busy formulating plans to involve various stakeholder groups in the process.

Career Education Conference

SD5 was able to support a team of teachers and principals to attend the CES conference this past week in Vancouver. This was an important opportunity as the Ministry was showcasing its new Career Exploration curriculum and many district were able to show how they support programs which fit into this new applied skill curriculum area. SD5 was well represented, with our Elementary Skills Training program (tinker time!) and our Introduction to Construction 9 program.

Safe Schools Coordinator

The provincial safe school coordinator meeting was held this past month in Richmond. A fair chunk of the day was spent on issues of safety and acceptance of LGBTQ2S+ students, with an examination of the startling statistics associated with substance use and suicide rates. As well, we have secured dates for level 4 'Train the Trainer' for Violence Threat Risk Assessments (V/TRAs). The dates will be April 20/21, and we will be sending a team to Nelson in SD8.

Update from Director of Student Learning and Innovation

Collaborative Inquiry Projects:

Teams of teacher-learners working together to improve practice and student achievement.



We currently have 38 Learning Rounds in progress. Areas of sharing/learning include:

- Developing Cross-curricular competencies and Project Base Learning and the revised Curriculum
 - -Differentiated Instruction as it pertains to Curricular Competencies
 - -Carole Fullerton Making Sense of Math/Math Games
 - Continued exploration of the Mind Up curriculum and the effects on self-regulation

 - Implementation of The Daily Five and its effect on student achievement

The list is quite impressive with the financial support exceeding \$90,000. The learning rounds will be summarized at the beginning of June and plans for a spring sharing forum is under construction. It should also be noted that other projects focusing on the trades (Maker Day, Tinker Time, Yes 2 It etc.) will be supported with the Ed Plan dollars.





Update from the District Principal of Technology

The IBM conversion at Elkford Secondary School is now complete. Thank-you to the technology team for making this transition smooth and seamless for the staff and students. Jaffray Elementary/Secondary School is scheduled for conversion the week of Nov 30- December 4.

The training process has started with teachers in our district on how to set up a class website, a class/school blog as well as how to share documents in the portal. Update from the Director of Instruction/ **Human Resources**

Human Resources to date has filled 149 teaching and 145 CUPE positions for the current school year.

Education Fund positions have all been posted and filled and those supports will be in place for the remainder of the 2015-16 school year.

Human Resources attended a career fair in Victoria November 21, 2015 in an attempt to recruit for hard to fill positions and TTOCs for our communities. We spoke with over 30 interested teachers and interviewed 9 of them in a 4.5 hour window. Some of these teachers were still in the last year of their studies and we will look forward to processing their application once graduation for them has occurred.



Update from the District Principal/Student Services

The CommunityLINK report for the 2014-15 school year has been submitted to the Ministry of Children and Families. It is through this funding we are able to employ eleven Youth Care Workers and continued to serve the needs of students who are vulnerable socially, emotionally and require food at school.

OF COD

So far in 2015-16, we have received \$6,156 in financial contribution from service clubs to accompany the \$17,700 the District provides to school for the meals programs. Many YCWs also apply for financial support grants and have made relationships with food vendors in the five communities to augment the school meals program further. Many thanks to our YCWs.

Separate whole District meetings with YCWs and School Counsellors have helped to further identify their roles on School Based Teams and in supporting students to access curriculum and attain success.

The two Student Services Coordinators and a consultant from Special Education Technology BC have provided four days of training for all grade 7 students in the District along with their English Language Arts teachers. These students and teachers will learn how to use a web application called Firefly and software called Kurzweil 3000 to improve student access to written text. The programs read text from the web, textbooks, novels, and more to help those students who comprehend better from hearing information. Students commented on the writing planning tools within the program and how they could use them to organize their thoughts. Attending teachers talked with each other about ways this technology could change their approach to teaching. Altogether 408 grade 7 students and 17 English Language Arts teachers and a handful of Student Services Teachers became very excited

about the possibilities of such a program. SD5 subscribes to a license for every student K-12 and has unlimited adult licenses as a result. Thanks to the coordinators.

World Diabetes Awareness Day was recognized on Saturday Nov 14th in our District our email campaign which presented the Canadian Charter for Diabetes and was loaded with resources to be used with students, staff and parents. Of course, Darcy did not miss an opportunity to connect diabetes to what we should be doing around promoting healthy schools.

NOW THEREFORE the Board enacts as follows:

- 1. The capital project of the Board approved by the Minister and specifying a maximum expenditure of \$750,000 for Project No. **155491** is hereby adopted.
- 2. This bylaw may be cited as "School District No. 5 (Southeast Kootenay) Capital Project Bylaw 155491".
