The Cranbrook trustees will meet to review this Proposal from the City and formulate a response for the Public Hearing on January 27th. Trustee Johns would like more time given for due diligence of this proposal.

1. COMMENCEMENT OF MEETING

1.1 Call to Order

I want to acknowledge that we have gathered here in the Homelands of the Ktunaxa people. The Advocacy/Education Committee Meeting of January 27, 2020 was called to order at 9:35 a.m. by Co-Chair Whalen.

1.2 Approval of Agenda

1.3 Approval of Minutes

2. PRESENTATIONS

2.1 Professional Development - Judi Poole

Judi Poole attended a Board approved professional development conference in San Francisco on February 23, 2019 on "Empathy". Highlights included:

- 3 guiding questions: What led her to attend conference? What are the conference takeaways? How will her new learning impact both the school and the district?
- Judi shared how her journey started at Pinewood Elementary school and how she is continuing that journey
- with the help of her school staff they decided to develop a different way of dealing with behaviors in the school other than a punitive approach; students and staff becoming partners in fixing the school culture
- organized school-wide book study
- looked at social emotional learning vs. discipline in the school
- worked with teachers on increasing empathy
- administered a school-wide survey of students on how as a staff they could connect with students and get to know them better
- the conference highlighted the 9 empathy competencies, provided great resources on the brain and empathy training and she came away with tools on how to connect better with the students
- bought in Mind-Up Program; Big Brothers & Big Sisters Program

Her ultimate goal - her office to be a place to celebrate student success and a place where students could tell their stories. A list of the books presented at the meeting will be provided to Trustees.

3. ITEMS FORWARDED FROM PREVIOUS MEETING

3.1 September District Professional Development Day, 2020 Update - Jason Tichauer

Western Financial Place has been contacted to use as the venue for a district-wide professional development day on September 18, 2020 for all staff, TTOCs and casual employees. We are waiting for them to get back to us. Joe Pierre is also reaching out to his community regarding the key note speaker for the day.

3.2 Update on Cost of Busses with Seat Belts - Alan Rice

Secretary-Treasurer Rice reported no updated costs of busses with seat belts at this time and that he is working on this issue with a transportation consultant. This is a very complex issue. A further report will be brought back to the February committee meeting.

4. CORRESPONDENCE AND/OR NEW ITEMS

4.1 DSAC Report - Information from the students on vaping, climate action and menstrual survey

Trustee Bellina reported that the DSAC meeting held on January 9, 2020 at the KLC was the best meeting ever. She outlined the activities of the day and thanked the various people who were involved in the planning.

Student information was gathered on climate change and information was brought to the meeting for the Trustees to look at. Vaping information from the students will be brought back to the February committee meeting. We have asked the students what current initiatives are happening in their schools and also what initiatives work in their buildings. Menstrual survey results were shared along with the recent statistics from the McCreary Adolescent Report.

Other climate action initiatives around the community – the City of Cranbrook is holding a climate change information session on February 11, 7-9 p.m. at the College of the Rockies in the lecture theatre. Trustee Johns will invite Paul Matthews and his MBSS students to a future Board meeting to come and talk about climate action initiatives in their school.

4.2 DPAC Report

Trustee Turner reported that DPAC representation has increased significantly. At the December DPAC meeting there were 10 members representing 11 schools out of 17. DPAC expressed an interest in having a vaping presentation sometime in February for parents. DPAC will organize and the district will help to promote and provide presenters and the venue. Date still to be decided on. DPAC was also very interested in hearing the Superintendent's report on the Inclusive Education Group. RMES PAC did a fundraiser for their intermediate playground structure; SES PAC have installed a sensory path in the Kindergarten area of their school and GTES PAC has raised \$6766 for their Nepal school; they are now working on the second story of the school. The school also won 2nd prize for the annual gingerbread house competition.

4.3 School Growth Plans

A list of all school growth plan goals was provided in the committee package. These school growth plan goals tie into Principal/Vice-Principal goals which will tie into district goals. Binders have been prepared which have copies of every school growth plan. A binder will be put in Sandy Gronlund's office for Trustees to peruse. Trustee Johns asked what his role was in this process as a Trustee. Superintendent Yardley responded that it may be helpful for Trustees to know what their individual schools are working on. Plans also tie into the budget process so that the district can look at providing financial support to schools. When the new framework for enhancing student learning from the Ministry of Education is presented then we as a district can start working on our strategic plan. Lots of good things happening in schools and lots of good professional development.

The Policy Committee meeting of January 27, 2020 was called to order at 12:07 pm by Co-Chair Trustee Turner.

1.2. Approval of the Agenda

3. BUSINESS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MEETING

3.1 Policy – Provision of Menstrual Products to Students – Student Survey Results

3.2 Policy 3.14 Provision of Menstrual Products to Students – Regulations

Mr. Tichauer reviewed the Student Survey Results and Feedback. The regulations have been set out directly as a result of the survey. Further discussions regarding the survey results included:

- Student preference of plastic versus cardboard. Trustee Bellina raised concerns over this for environmental reasons.
- The timeframe (two years) that the survey be completed again to ensure that the District is meeting student needs.

4. CORRESPONDENCE AND/OR NEW ITEMS

4.1 Revised Policy 3.33 - Use of Cell Phones and Digital Devices

Mrs. Casault reviewed the changes to the Revised Policy – Use of Cell Phones and Digital Devices. The changes included the following revisions:

- Students may use cell phones during instructional time to improve student engagement and learning at the discretion of the teacher
- Students should have all cell phones and other digital devices silenced and out
 of sight unless permission by the teacher has been granted
- Repeated offences may follow a progressive discipline model

Other discussions regarding this policy included:

- The use of cell phones and other digital devices in change rooms or washrooms is not permitted at any time
- The prohibited use of social media during instructional time
- The elimination of the section of the policy regarding the use of cell phones and other digital devices while driving. The Motor Vehicle Act, Section 3.1 was added to this policy to clearly define the prohibition of use while operating a motor vehicle.
- Trustee McPhee also suggested that the wording of student engagement should be removed from this policy.
- Co-Chair Turner discussed an email that was received about this policy.
- Superintendent Yardley addressed the important fact that the policy allows for leeway and flexibility for staff and schools.
- Mrs. Casault gave examples of the manner in which schools in School District 5 (Southeast Kootenay) are dealing with devices in the classroom.

The revised policy will now be sent to partner groups for feedback.

4.2 Revised Policy 3.42 - Students Registered for Distance Education

Mr. Tichauer reviewed the changes to the policy. He stated that the revisions have modernized the policy and clarified that students registered for Distance Education in School District 5 (Southeast Kootenay) may apply for participation in additional programs and activities that may be available in community schools.

Trustee McPhee expressed concern regarding the wording of Policy 3.42. Trustee McPhee suggested that the language should be more clearly defined.

Other discussion included:

- The clarification of the roles of Home School versus Distance Education
- The availability of Distance Education to all students
- The advantages of Distance Education to reach all learners
- The specific reasons that students might register for Distance Education

The policy, with revisions, will now be sent to partner groups for feedback.

5. INFORMATION ITEMS

Mrs. Casault asked that the Health Promoting Schools Policy be added to the April Policy Committee Meeting due the Special Education compliance audit that is taking place in February.

The Special Education Student Services meeting of January 27, 2020 was called to order at 10:37 by Co-Chair McPhee.

1.2 Approval of the Agenda

M/S that the agenda for the Special Education Student Services Meeting of January 27, 2020 be approved as circulated.

1.3 Approval of the Minutes

M/S that the minutes of the Special Education Student Services meeting of November 25, 2019 be approved as circulated.

2. BUSINESS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MINUTES

2.1 Speech Language Pathologist Conference Report

Director of Student Learning and Innovation, Diane Casault introduced Preschool SLP (Speech and Language Pathologist), Lesley Runzer. Lesley had attended the Apraxia Kids National Conference in Pittsburgh in July and made a presentation to the Student Services Committee ("the Committee") via Zoom about what she learned. She thanked the Committee for giving her time to present. The next Apraxia Conference is in Dallas July 2020. Trustee Turner asked if there are any SLPs working at the school level who would be interested in attending the session in Dallas? She strongly recommended that other Speech Language Pathologists attend. This learning is such direct, valuable information that applies to children immediately. Mrs. Casault stated that as the Board is open to someone else attending this year she will share this information with the SLP group. Trustee McPhee thanked her for her time today and in sharing the knowledge that she gained with other Speech Language Pathologists in the Kootenay area.

2.2 Social Emotional Learning Centre ("SELC") Update

Mrs. Casault updated the Student Services Committee on the Social Emotional Learning Centre (SELC). Mrs. Casault showed the Committee the before and after pictures of the SELC classroom as well as the newsletter that teacher, Tanya Meijer, shares with parents.

Mrs. Casault also shared the developments in the program including comfort bins, zones or regulation, breathing exercises and movement outside of the classroom.

There are still outstanding items that require clarification such as the role of the host school, Highlands Elementary. The importance of distinguishing the role of the school itself in addition to the itinerants, staff and administration.

Mrs. Casault also clarified how the selection process for the first cohort took place. The students were hand picked based on needs, parent support and referrals by the itinerant team and Student Services Coordinator. Mrs. Casault felt it was important to articulate to all schools the process for application to the program. The process needs to be transparent however not all children can be accepted.

Trustee Kitt queried Mrs. Casault regarding parent feedback. She wondered if there has been a great deal of parent involvement and how parents are responding to the program. Mrs. Casault responded that more time will be spent with parents to support and understand the program. The process needs to be transparent however not all children can be accepted.

Mr. Verbeurgt discussed the ongoing training sessions for the classroom teachers of students in the Social Emotional learning Centre. These sessions are hosted by the Behavioral Resource Teacher, Megan Stasuik, and aim to help classroom teachers' support in all areas of Social Emotional Learning.

The Social Emotional Learning Centre updates will remain on the agenda of the Student Services Committee. The goals of these updates will be to keep the Board of Education informed of the progress of the Social Emotional Learning Centre and to evaluate the program's length, learning outcomes and supports.

2.3 Prevalence Model - Funding Model Review

Trustee Johns discussed the attachments to the agenda. He stressed the importance of all Trustees being informed on how the future may look based on the funding model review. He also felt it was problematic that the correspondence that the Board has sent to the Ministry has not received a response. Trustee Johns reminded the Trustees of the uniqueness of School District 5 (Southeast Kootenay) in both geographical distances and diversity.

Conversations regarding the Prevalence Model will be respectfully referred to the In Camera Finance Operations meeting.

At the time, Superintendent Yardley also briefly discussed the upcoming compliance audit of Student Services in School District No. 5 (Southeast Kootenay). Mrs. Yardley informed the Trustees that at least four other districts were being audited as well.

2.4 Laurie Middle School Update

Mrs. Casault gave a brief update of the ongoing agenda item. Mr. Reimer also updated the Student Services Committee on the recent improvements of communication and general structure at Laurie Middle School. Mr. Reimer also addressed other concerns regarding the Academic Options (AO) program at Laurie Middle School.

Trustee Turner raised concerns regarding students in the AO Program. That are not pursuing academics. Mr. Reimer assured that the AO is not the same as a modified program and that the AO program meets the needs of a variety of students.

Mrs. Casault confirmed the Laurie Middle School Update will continue to be an agenda item for the Student Services Committee.

Trustee Johns reiterated the situation at Laurie Middle School is moving positively forward for both students and staff. Trustee Johns asked if feedback from Laurie Middle School staff such as student services teachers, classroom teachers and education assistants could be brought forth at the upcoming meetings.

More discussions regarding Laurie Middle School to be discussed at the In Camera meeting.

2.5 Inclusive Education Working Group

Mrs. Yardley updated the Student Services Committee on the Inclusive Education Working Group meeting on January 16, 2020. Mrs. Yardley reviewed the parking lot items and discussed the addition of two classroom teachers in the Working Group.

Mrs. Yardley discussed commonality of recruitment issues in Student Services Teachers hiring across the province. She also discussed the Working Group break out session where the roles of Student Services Teachers and Education Assistants were reviewed. The Working Group will meet again on February 28 to continue to look at defining these roles. There will also be presentations from teachers as they share 'A Day in the Life of a Classroom Teacher in SD5'.

3. CORRESPONDENCE AND/OR NEW ITEMS

Solving the Mysteries of Other Planets

Mrs. Kirkpatrick's class at Highlands Elementary School traveled to a distant planet just before the Christmas holidays. Students were challenged to build a rover using the Lego Wedo robotics kits and then utilize other tools such as 360 cameras and Microbits to gather data about the foreign planet. Their designs had to be able to drive down a short tunnel, through a curtain and into the "fake planet chamber" where there were secret messages and clues to the environment on that planet. Students also explored space travel through the magic of VR using SD5's Oculus Ouest headset.

Growing Innovations Projects and grant recipients

We currently have two proposals as part of the rural teachers Growing Innovations projects which are extensions from last year's submissions.

A multidisciplinary innovation initiative about inquiry into sustainability in Elkford, B.C., is a project involving school, regional and corporate partners led by Indigenous ecological knowledge and student learning toward "many plantings of trees in our area"

This project explores the "barriers and benefits" of using Virtual Reality (VR) in an educational environment. With the involvement of 5 local communities (Cranbrook, Jaffray, Fernie, Sparwood, Elkford), all schools in the district will participate in developing a "student centered, inquiry-based approach" in the use of VR in exploring student engagement in the emerging contexts of the BC curriculum.


Previous projects include:

In Sparwood, sciences, social studies, and First Peoples curricula are explored together in this project with student identity, and diverse student identities, as a 'common' focus. Through tanning animal skins, and expanding the activity both out (into community) and in (as identity exploration), many purposes are being discovered and served (including creating costumes for a play and selling skins) in a context of shared inquiry that engages educational practices and communities in local histories, particularly those of the Métis and Ktunaxa peoples.

Students from three high schools join with leaders in arts, business, outdoors and other community organizations collaborate in a cross-curricular initiative of inquiry "to engage students in service learning while supporting them in producing long lasting art pieces (sculptures) that represent themselves and their communities." How does creating a "bridge" between schools and their contexts create opportunities for students in the future?

Third Annual Premier's Awards for Excellence in Education: Nominations are being accepted until April 30, 2020 for the third annual Premier's Awards for Excellence in Education. This is an opportunity to nominate and recognize B.C. teachers, administrators and support workers who are making a positive impact on students and their school communities.
