LEARNING TOGETHER IN SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 5 (SOUTHEAST KOOTENAY)



Southeast Kootenay School District is alive with celebration as we move into the festive season. Across our communities, students and staff are preparing concerts, winter festivals and special events that highlight the remarkable talent and creativity found in every school. December brings a special kind of energy to education, and this year our classrooms and performance spaces have been filled with anticipation, music and joy.

One of the most treasured traditions in our region is the annual mass choir performance, known today as the Cranbrook Children's Christmas Choir. This longstanding community event takes place on the first Wednesday of December each year, and its roots reach back to the 1960's.

The format familiar to us today has been in place since 1971. The origins of the choir reflect a meaningful story of cultural exchange. When Roy Barnett, principal of Amy Woodland School, arrived from England, he brought with him the idea of a school-based mass choir, a tradition common in English schools. Working alongside dedicated educators, including the father, Brian Lutz, of current second-generation music teacher Kim Lutz, Barnett helped bring the vision to life. What began as a shared idea has grown into a multi-generational tradition that continues to unite our community. Today, more than 300 students from nine schools join together, supported by music teachers who collaborate to select songs, coordinate conducting roles and manage the many logistics involved in preparing young performers for such an important evening. For students, the performance is always a night to remember, and for families and staff, it remains a joyful reminder of the power of community.

Throughout the fall and early winter, Trustees have been engaging directly with schools across the District. Their visits provide valuable opportunities to connect with staff and students, observe classroom learning and gain insight into the initiatives and experiences that shape daily life in our schools. These connections continue to strengthen relationships and deepen our collective understanding of the work happening across the District.

This season, we are also reflecting on a key element of our 2024 to 2028 Strategic Plan, which calls us to amplify student voices and transform systems so that every learner is supported, included and empowered. This focus was at the heart of our professional learning day on December 4, when principals, vice principals, itinerant teachers, district leaders and community partners gathered for a full day of learning inspired by the work of Dr. Sean Lessard. Together, participants explored how systems shift when we listen deeply, build relationships and honour the diverse experiences of students and families. This work is guiding the District as we move forward thoughtfully and intentionally.

With report cards now distributed and Foundational Skills Assessments complete, we enter a period of reflection on student learning. In assessing how we are doing as a district, we look to triangulated data that combines provincial, district and school-based evidence. These measures help identify trends and shape future goals. Yet data alone never tells the full story. Every student has a unique background, a personal set of experiences and individual strengths that numbers cannot fully capture. Understanding these stories is essential to providing meaningful support. Evidence informed practice combined with relationship centred understanding remains at the heart of our work in the Southeast Kootenay District.

As we celebrate the holiday season, we remain mindful that this time of year can be challenging formany students and families. If support is needed, please reach out to your school. Staff and community partners are ready to help ensure that every child and family feels cared for and connected.

As we close the year, we extend our thanks to students, families, staff and community members for the care, dedication and spirit they bring to the District. May your holidays be filled with warmth, connection and rest. We look forward to continuing to learn together in the new year.

District Numeracy Teacher, Nicole Fulton


This month the District Numeracy Teacher worked with staff at TM Roberts Elementary to explore how manipulatives can strengthen number sense across the grades. They looked at how consistent use of handson tools helps students build on previous learning as they move from kindergarten to grade 6. Time was also spent on the BC Learning Pathways and how they can support shared language around mathematical thinking and proficiency.

The Coast Metro Elementary Math Project website (https://coastmetro.ca/elementary-math-project/) was another valuable resource, especially the spiraled year plans that allow teachers to revisit key ideas throughout the year.

At Highlands Elementary, grades two and three students took part in a lesson on math identity inspired by research from Liesl McConchie. Students drew their "math gremlins," externalizing unhelpful thoughts instead of internalizing them, and wrote positive affirmations to talk back to their gremlins. Rekenrek building was shared with grade one classes across the District including Steeples, Frank J. Mitchell, and Isabella Dicken, giving students a visual and tactile tool to model counting and early operations.

Lights and Robotics

Students from Ms. Spergel's grade one class explored the concepts of lights and robotics by building coloured flashlights. They took the flashlights outside to observe the interplay of different colours reflecting on the snow.

Sweater Ornaments

Ms. Bisson's class from Rocky Mountain Elementary enjoyed a field trip to the Design Lab in Fernie, where they designed and created ugly sweater ornaments using 3D pens.

Digital Tools Across the District

This year, students and teachers across the District are embracing digital platforms to enhance learning and communication. Over 750 students have joined Typing Pal and Tap'Touche, boosting their digital literacy skills in both English and French. Seesaw continues to thrive, with more than 40 classes and nearly 1,000 students sharing their learning and connecting with families. As high school teachers transition to Microsoft Teams, the Transformative Learning Team (TLT) has stepped up to support by meeting educators in schools, online, and helping with account setup to ensure a smooth shift into modern learning environments.



Students from Mrs. Porter's class at Steeples enjoyed an exciting hands-on visit focused on creativity and problem-solving. The day began with a brainstorming session about what cross-country skiers feel, see, and say, sparking imaginative ideas for a ski-themed environment. Using LEGO, cardboard, and ChompSaws, students built a dynamic ski area complete with jumps, mountains, hills, trees, and even animals. After constructing and customizing LEGO cross-country skiers, the fun continued as students programmed their skiers to navigate the obstacles they had created. This engaging activity combined design, technology, and teamwork, giving students a chance to bring their ideas to life in a playful and interactive way.



Corrugated Costumes

Students in Mr. Flegel's class recently brought their imaginations to life through a hands-on design challenge using Chompsaws, a student friendly cardboard table saw and MakeDo kits, school friendly reusable screws and tools. Their cardboard creations included a sophisticated penguin, a remote control and TV, and a whimsical unicorn. Before building, students used an AI image generator to visualize their ideas, supported by a teacher to help them plan the scale and structure of each costume. This process also sparked thoughtful discussions about the limitations of AI-generated designs, as students identified which elements were realistic and which needed to be adapted for the physical world.
