
Thank you to the Board of Education for approving the vision and mission statements along with the new logo. The French Immersion staff are excited to begin using them on informational pamphlets and swag!



### **Holiday Ornaments**

Elk Valley students had the opportunity to design and make holiday ornaments at the Design Lab in Fernie. Students from Ms. Barras' class at Isabella Dicken designed Lego people that were cut on the laser cutter. Other classes assembled articulated reindeer cut from the laser cutter. Ms. Rooney's class from Frank J. Mitchell also created stop motion videos of dancing reindeer.

### **Mine Managers**

Mr. Buch's class recently had an exciting visit to the Design Lab, where they engaged in a variety of handson activities that combined the world of mining with Lego robotics. The students created their own mines and explored the fascinating world of autonomous mine robots. They discussed how jobs in the mining industry might change in the future and even built their own mines using cardboard and MakeDo Screws. These robots were coded to navigate the mines and retrieve precious resources, which, in this case, were Lego ingots and rare precious pom-poms. The class had the opportunity to use 3D printed excavator buckets, adding another layer of innovation to their learning experience. It was a day filled with creativity, collaboration and problem solving!

### **Hour of Code 2024**

Gordon Terrace hosted an exciting Hour of Code event in December, led by the Helping Teachers of Transformative Learning, Allie Kostiuk from University of Victoria and student teachers. All classes from the school had the opportunity to engage in five different activities that explored the world of coding. Students used algorithms to solve Rubik's Cubes and participated in unplugged coding activities, such as coding their friends to navigate an obstacle course and using computational thinking to find pirate treasure. They also programmed robots like Ozobots and iRobots and explored Artificial Intelligence through coding. It was a fantastic experience that sparked creativity and interest in technology among the students.

### **Lego Fighter Pilot Training**

Ms. Schadeli's class at Kootenay Orchards School recently delved into the fascinating world of speed, time, and distance to combine math, science and ADST. Students created centrifuges and spun their Lego characters as fast as possible using different lengths of rotating arms. They explored speed, the concepts of circles, variables, the scientific method, and fair tests. Impressively, some groups managed to spin their Lego person close to 30 km/hr, almost as fast as Usain Bolt's World Record in the 100 metre dash! It was an engaging and educational experience that brought math concepts to life in a fun and interactive way.
