Early Learning, Chile Care and Literacy

Starting school is an exciting milestone for both children and their families. As your child begins learning to read, know that their early literacy skills are being supported every day in the classroom. Early literacy skills are the foundational abilities children develop before they can fully read, and they are essential for becoming confident, lifelong learners.

The essential components of early literacy and reading development include phonemic awareness, phonics, accurate and fluent reading of connected text, reading comprehension, and vocabulary and language skills. Phonemic awareness and phonics help children understand how sounds and letters work together to form words. As children practice reading, they develop accuracy and fluency, allowing them to read smoothly and with expression. Strong vocabulary and language skills support comprehension which is the ability to make meaning from what is read. Together, these skills form the foundation for confident, successful readers.

Here are some great ways to support your child's learning at home: Reading together each day, visiting the local library, and sharing stories. These are simple yet enjoyable ways to build a love of reading. There are many free and playful activities that help your child develop early reading skills such as like learning letter names, hearing sounds, and discovering new words. Most importantly, remember that the greatest gift you can give your child is sharing the joy of reading: talk about stories, ask questions, and celebrate their progress along the way.



Alternate Pathways - Learning Online

Kootenay Discovery School (KDS) is excited to announce a new 2-credit Board Authority Authorized (BAA) course, Essentials of Online Learning 10. This course is designed for all learners, from secondary students to adults, and equips them with the essential skills needed to thrive in online learning environments such as Brightspace (D2L).


Essentials of Online Learning 10 introduces students to the principles of effective online learning, with a focus on digital literacy, information management, communication skills, and time management strategies. Through engaging modules such as Navigating Brightspace, Digital Citizenship and Academic Integrity, Submissions, Communicating with Your Teacher, and Discussion Forums, students gain hands-on experience that supports success in both online and in-person courses.

The course emphasizes three Big Ideas: digital citizens have rights and responsibilities in an increasingly global society; effective time management and organizational strategies reduce stress and lead to success; and proficiency in the digital landscape contributes to a healthier, more ethical online presence.

The course also acknowledges the importance of integrating Indigenous worldviews and perspectives into online learning as an ongoing goal. While this work is still developing, KDS is committed to creating more inclusive and respectful educational spaces that reflect interconnectedness, community, and care for the environment.

With the growing importance of digital and hybrid learning environments including in post-secondary education, where many institutions use platforms like Brightspace, Essentials of Online Learning 10 helps students prepare for the future of learning and work. All new KDS cross-enrolled, full-time, and adult learners are automatically enrolled in this course, and some middle school students are completing it as part of their Careers program. Registration is simple, just complete the form on the Kootenay Discovery School website.

KDS offers a flexible and accessible learning option for high school and adult learners, allowing students to learn from anywhere and at any time. This flexibility helps learners balance school with extracurricular activities, part-time jobs, or family responsibilities.

Pinecone Pets

Ms. Malmberg's class at Kootenay Orchards Elementary kicked off the year with an imaginative dive into the Design Process through a hands-on Transformative Learning Team Activity. Students explored iteration by constructing pipe cleaner towers and crafting Pinecone Pet Shelters, inspired by a custom Al-generated story about a pinecone preparing for winter. Each student brought a pinecone to life with simple craft materials, then headed outdoors to build snow-resistant shelters out of natural materials. Their designs were put to the test using reams of paper which was an inventive way to simulate snowfall and evaluate structural strength!



Fourth Annual Arcade

Over 120 students at Laurie Middle School brought imagination to life during this year's Caine's Arcade challenge. Inspired by the story of a young boy in East Los Angeles who built his own cardboard arcade, students designed and constructed their own games using only cardboard and crafting supplies. This year's creations were some of the most inventive yet featuring hits like Horseshoes, Rope Ring Toss, Plinko, Whack-A-Mole, and Skeeball. The event wrapped up with a gym full of laughter and excitement as students played and celebrated each other's arcade masterpieces.

Digital Tools Across the District

This year, students and teachers across the District are embracing digital platforms to enhance learning and communication. Over 750 students have joined Typing Pal and Tap'Touche, boosting their digital literacy skills in both English and French. Seesaw continues to thrive, with more than 40 classes and nearly 1,000 students sharing their learning and connecting with families. As high school teachers transition to Microsoft Teams, the Transformative Learning Team (TLT) has stepped up to support by meeting educators in schools, online, and helping with account setup to ensure a smooth shift into modern learning environments.



3D Pen Halloween Tealights

Students from Mme. Roe's class at Ecole Isabella Dicken Elementary participated in a design project at the lab where they crafted Halloween tealights using 3D pens.

Throughout this creative process, they not only honed their artistic abilities but also developed skills such as perseverance and patience! Also, a big shout out to Ms. Whitson for her amazing help and support with the students.


