1.1 Call to Order

The Advocacy/Education Committee meeting of April 25, 2016 was called to order at 9:03 a.m. by Co-Chair Ayling.

2. PRESENTATIONS

2.1 I-Ride Presentation

John Mandryk, Mel McFarlane, Glenn Dobie and Randy McLeod presented the iRide Youth Cycling Program. Highlights included:

- Cycling BC has developed a program called iRide to introduce children to the sport of cycling; targeting grade 4 students
- 5-6 schools in Cranbrook are already running the program along with JEJSS
- Program really starting to build enthusiasm throughout region
- Have trained 7-8 coaches so far in Cranbrook
- asking for SD5's Boards' blessing and feedback

Discussion/Comments:

- Would like to see it extend beyond Jaffray
- Incorporate training for coaches in the RSA Day next year
- 26 bikes have been donated since the start of the Program; each school tells iRide how many bikes are needed for the class
- iRide stores bikes as well as maintains them
- various modules to add to training i.e., maintenance, safety
- I-ride coaching clinic is 2 days of training; 1 day is possible but a bit overwhelming; if teachers already have level 1 coaching they would need 1 day of training
- actual sessions are 3-4 hours
- program partners looking for more of a formal buy-in
- June is ride to work month with a possible iRide to school day in 2017
- sponsorship by the Board would be helpful
- huge lack of bike safety knowledge throughout community

Recommendation A – M/S that the Board of Education write a letter of support for the IRide Youth Cycling Program.

2.2 School Growth Plan – Laurie Middle School

David Standing presented Laurie Middle School's Growth Plan. Highlights included:

- Growth plan in action; staff worked with 3 questions to form Plan
- How can the current timetable structure be changed to better meet the needs of students?
- How can we meet the grade level science inquiry based opportunities outlined in the new science curriculum?
- How can Project Based Learning be incorporated into each grade specific level to complement the goals of the new social studies curriculum?
- Why? timetable right now does allow for flexibility; need to engage students with new curriculum
- Need to take a closer look at a particular group that are not engaged
- big ideas curriculum allows us to do things in ways we have never done in the past; students deserve it
- teachers need to be mentors now and help students find things that excites them

- inquiry focus for science and socials
- What? through collaborative teams i.e., group heading to lower mainland to visit two innovative schools to look at their alternate timetable structures
- Will it work? It's not always easy; it will work if we respect where everyone is at in the continuum
- Science and Socials PLCs have come up with plans on what they are going to do with the new curriculum; we are all committed; Administration is committed to supporting teachers with change

Questions/Comments:

- Timetable changes and using MyEducation to report MyEducation is not staying static; it will change to meet the needs of province
- Not a lot of feedback/questions from parent community responding to changes to curriculum
- parent information night set with DPAC in June in both Cranbrook and the Elk Valley
- LMS combining May 31 year end band concert with the grand reopening of new gym; will send invite to Board and major contributors/partners/media

A discussion took place on this Section and clarification was given as follows:

- new policy has come out from the Ministry on physical restraint and seclusion which has been shared with all staff
- confusion around reasonable steps or reasonable force;
- criminal law is federal law
- provincial government stepping in and making pseudo law
- if a Section is repealed federally it doesn't matter what provincial law is
- if you look at case law on the Section you might have a better sense of why this letter has been written
- the slang for this Section is called the "spanking law"; it's about using force for discipline and not about restraint
- this Section is original criminal code used back in the days when schools were allowed corporal punishment this is more for parents and not for schools

Mr. Norum reported that we have applied for 3 projects to be covered:

- Phase II MBSS Mechanical update \$270,000 (overage of bids)

Trustee Report: Doug McPhee May 2016

I read in the Parkland "Ships Log" for May 2-6 that for individual subject area classes there are 14 classes left before the end of the school year. I can remember that time well. At the beginning of my career, I would take a portion of the dwindling time remaining to go over governmental exams with the students in Physics and Algebra. We are currently advertising for the principalship vacancy at Gordon Terrace elementary for September, 2016. Shortlisting and interviews will begin soon.






