3.1 Stage 2 Restart Protocol Update - Secretary Treasurer

Secretary Treasurer Rice has received updates from the Provincial Health Officer last week with changes to the K-12 documents. The main changes were that staff must always wear a mask and the grade 4-6 students are now included in the mask mandate along with the recommendation for K-3 students.

We are waiting to hear more information on the COVID-19 vaccine role out. The age bracket of 40 and over may be able to register soon for the vaccine. The district is encouraging SD5 employees to register and obtain the vaccine as soon as their age group is announced. We are looking at how we can support the employees to leave work to receive their vaccine if after work appointment is not available.

We are beginning to see a rise in COVID-19 cases in BC, so we need to be vigilant in keeping up with the safety protocols and adhere to the "no non-essential travel".

- parents appreciated the Cheq data presentation held in February and looking forward to the EDI presentation at the May DPAC meeting
- meetings continue to be well attended on Zoom

4.3 Framework for Enhancing Student Learning (FESL) - update from Silke Yardley

Superintendent Yardley reported:

- met with principals/vice-principals yesterday and shared the draft FESL and how it ties into their school growth plans
- will include any feedback received by the principals/vice-principals with the Working Group which is scheduled for May 10, 2021
- will gather any feedback from them and then present the draft to the board at the June board meeting for final approval
- meeting again with the principals/vice-principals on May 27 to help support them with their school growth plans based on the draft FESL

4.4 Child Care - Update from Alan Rice/Diane Casault

Secretary-Treasurer Rice reported:

- work still being done regarding the location at the Fernie Learning Center
- funds have been approved for additional space; exponential growth and enrolment at Isabella Dicken Elementary
- looking at where we can put Strongstart
- look at what additional services we can still offer to meet criteria for grant
- waiting to hear from MCFD as lots of moving pieces
- talking with BCPSEA on child care as a whole
- working with both the BCGEU and CUPE as there are discussions as to what union child care employees would fall into; lots of questions still need to be answered
- focus is to continue working with our third party providers as we have been
- Strongstart employees will have a letter of agreement and will attach to our current CUPE contract; meeting with executive soon to bring StrongStart Coordinators in house

- Director Casault mentioned lots of questions out there and more information on this will be at Policy Committee today
- the Ministry hopes to release an official ministry policy in Spring 2021
- Chairperson Lento mentioned the BCSTA put together policy and respective contracts for third party providers
- an occupancy agreement is what we would enter into with our providers; template will be shared at the Policy Committee

1. COMMENCEMENT OF MEETING

1.1 Call to Order

The Policy Committee meeting of April 27, 2021 was called to order at 12:01 pm by Co-Chair Trina Ayling.

1.2 Approval of the Agenda

2. BUSINESS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MEETING

2.1 Policy Model and Administrative Procedures

Superintendent Yardley gave a brief update on the two working sessions in April with the Board and Dr. Leroy Sloan.

2.2 Child Care Policy

Discussions regarding the responsibility, sustainability and adequacy of future funding of the Child Care Policy.

Trustee Johns stated that the child care policy needs further research and clarification. He suggested that the Board be proactive and seek answers to funding questions. He recommended that a letter be written stating that properly funded child care must not come at the expense of the public education system. Trustee Johns requested this item be added to the next public Board meeting agenda.

Trustee Turner reiterated that the Board needs to be vocal about costs of child care and suggested that the Board take a position on this "sooner rather than later". She discussed the importance of understanding where the funding will come from. Director Casault clarified that she has taken part in discussions with other districts regarding the costs of the child care. Districts across the province are questioning the details and funding of this policy.

Trustee Ayling agreed that this policy needs to be further addressed in Advocacy and that a working group may need to be formed.

Chairperson Lento suggested the Board review the BCSTA Policy and interim information.

Trustee Bellina remarked that the complex situation needs to be investigated and understood prior to the policy being formalized.

2.1 Inclusive Education Working Group (Diane/Darcy)

There is one more meeting left this year scheduled for May. Anything brought up budget wise now, will be held off until fall. FESL was discussed at the last meeting. Most questions in the parking lot have been addressed and will be clarified when we start working on the Partners Handbook. The 3 year work and budget plan has been put out to the working group. Once all feedback is received it will be summarized and presented to the board.

2.2 Inclusive Education Handbook (Darcy)

MOE has developed a draft Inclusive Education policy as 2016 was the last version. The policy shows alignment with curriculum to meet the needs of all students. This document hasn't been reviewed yet by the Minister of Education.

Mr. Verbeurgt demonstrated the Student Services page on the SD5 portal showing us the variety of provincial links on the site as well as the links to the Inclusive Education Handbook, Student Services forms and our Staff Directory. All things Student Services will be housed in one spot. All our private documentation previously on the external page is now slowly being moved inside the portal.

Section 1 - Foundational Principles highlights three areas; Recognizing and Valuing Diversity, Supporting the Diversity of Learners, and Differentiated Instruction.

Section 2 – Planning for all - Outlines basic guidelines and philosophy. Includes targeted support as well as planning for Intensive Instruction and Supports. Strength based approach.

Section 3 - Roles & Responsibilities – this includes all individuals potentially connected to a student.

Section 4 - Services - will have a growing list of what the district, school and communities can offer.

Section 5 – Files & Binders - IEP development will be added here.

Section 6 - Appendices will include links for further information.

This will be an excellent educational resource for everyone, including new teachers & trustees.

Lessons from the pandemic: Relationships, connection, acknowledgement are all important. Most important relationship is between the classroom teacher and student and the work we do should strengthen this relationship. We need to accept that everyone has been traumatized. We need to be kinder, more patient and be mindful of building connections with kids. We've had a record number of referrals to school psychologists this year. We need to be present.

Transition from elementary to middle/secondary needs to remain a priority. We had a good process in the past. We've come up with a plan with the Student Services Coordinators where the students will get a virtual tour with the principal. For general population, small groups will meet outside the schools. We're looking

at shortening the spring transition to the last week of school and the week before school start up to complete the transitions, with COVID protocols in place.

Committee wondered what had occurred with the summary report of the Human and Social Development from the Student Learning Survey The original intent was to present the summary to this committee but this has now been incorporated into the FESL as it ties in with the supporting documentation.

Normally the school year starts off with the Trustees getting a tour of the school by a student. Until things change, a virtual tour would still be nice.

2.3 Behaviour Resource Teacher update (Darcy)

Two positions are currently available. 1.0 in Cranbrook has had several applicants and we will be following through with interviews. Discussion needs to occur around the 0.5 position in the Elk Valley as it continues to be difficult to fill.

2.4 Review of SLP Summary Data (Diane)

The first page of the document explains what data is captured in each column. The second page has been broken down by schools for the months of January, February and March. Students served on referrals total is an average over those three months. New Students are added each month. We do have an Excel spreadsheet for each individual school which we can share at the end of the school year. Next sharing will be at the Sept. Committee meeting to include data from January to the end of June.

Aboriginal students receiving support was documented as it relates to a subgroup when reporting to the Ministry.

1. COMMENCEMENT OF MEETING

1.1 Call to Order

The public Finance/Operations/Personnel Committee meeting of April 27, 2021 was called to order at 12:39 p.m. by Co-chair Trustee Johns.

1.3 Approval of the Minutes

2. BUSINESS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MINUTES

2.1 Budget 2021-22

Secretary Treasurer Rice noted that there will be another budget session with the Board on May 11th. He has been concentrating on the enrolment numbers in particular the kindergarten group as the expectation was a higher number. The hope is he will have a preliminary budget ready for the May 11th Board meeting.

Secretary Treasurer Rice has not heard of any specific educational funding for COVID-19 from the Federal and Provincial budget announcements for next year.

Operating and capital budgets are due to the Ministry of Education by June 30, 2021.

2.2 COVID-19 District Working Committee Update

Secretary Treasurer Rice delivered a brief update on the committee and reported that the last meeting was April 12th. They discussed the difficulty of teachers talking through masks all day. More requests for barriers have been received from schools for the teachers when standing in front of the class. The district has purchased over 250 air purifiers and would like to purchase more.

A report will be ready for the May 31st Finance/Operations/Personnel Committee meeting with a clearer picture of the spending to date of the COVID-19 federal funds received. These funds need to be spent by June 30, 2021.

The next meeting of the committee is planned for the beginning of next week.

3. DELEGATIONS/PRESENTATIONS (10 min max)

4. REPORTS

4.1 Stage 2 Restart Protocol Update - Secretary Treasurer

Along with what was covered in item 2.2, Secretary Treasurer Rice added that the Provincial Health Officer (PHO) has extended the Order and recommends "staying close to home" through the May long weekend.

Vaccines:

Secretary Treasurer Rice and Superintendent Yardley are working to coordinate our staff to be moved up on the provincial vaccination list. Currently, the ministry is focusing on "hot spots", communities with higher numbers of COVID-19 infections. The custodians continue to spray on a weekly basis at the schools to try to keep the schools as sterilized as possible.

Trustee Johns asked if there was anything the Board could do to support our staff being vaccinated sooner. Secretary Treasurer Rice reiterated that the vaccines are given to hot spots. It is a matter of whether there are a high number of exposures in our community. Trustee Turner replied that the ministry is now

encouraging 18+ year old people to register for the vaccine. She commended on how well the staff is working to make our schools as safe as possible. Trustee McPhee commented that the administration of vaccines in our community is very well executed. Trustee Bellina stated that the social media can be a deterrent to people getting immunized.

4.2 Stage 2 Restart Protocol Update – Superintendent

Superintendent Yardley indicated that our district has had three exposures in the schools last week and she encouraged everyone to be diligent in following the protocols set out. These exposures seem to be brought to the school but stops there and has not spread. The COVID-19 Interior Health trackers are very good about knowing what they require for tracing. The schools are doing amazing work and sticking to the protocols in place. We are not sure what September looks like and are hoping there will not be the need for strict protocols. The principals and vice-principals are planning their schedules for September with a backup plan for the protocols if required.

5. NEW BUSINESS

5.1 Select Standing Committee on Finance and Government Services

Co-chair Johns indicated that the public presentations will be in September. We should have an update for the May 31, 2021 Finance/Operations/Personnel Committee meeting. Special Education will be one item presented on.

5.2 School Life Cycle Funding

The final BCSTA report "the Case for Increased School Life Cycle Funding" is attached to the agenda. Berry Architect, who is currently working on a detailed study on Mount Baker Secondary School (MBSS), has provided us with their comments on this report. Trustee Kitt asked about the district's 5-year plan and the replacement ratings. Does the 5-year plan rank the school conditions? Secretary Treasurer Rice replied that there is a ministry formula that provides a score when we put together the long-range facility plan, which will be worked on this summer. Secretary Treasurer advised that the Ministry has announced one possibly two schools being replaced outside of an enrolment issue and serious conditions.

Trustee Johns advised that once the district has received George Berry's report from his study of MBSS, we can discuss our next move. Secretary Treasurer Rice will be looking at the other schools in the district for life cycle funding.

5.3 Federal/Provincial Budget - COVID-19 Funding

Secretary Treasurer Rice explained that no additional funding has been allocated to education. Both budgets have pools of funding and we will now wait to hear further announcements.

5.4 Draft 2021-22 Board and Committee Meetings Schedule

Secretary Treasurer Rice gave a brief overview of the draft Board and Committee meeting schedule for the 2021-22 school year attached to the agenda. He

pointed out there are two committee meetings that will fall on a Tuesday as opposed to a Monday due to a stat holiday and a PRO-D day.

RECOMMENDATION A

M/S that the Board approve the draft 2021-22 Board and Committee meeting dates attached to the agenda. Meeting locations in schools will be considered once the Public Health Officer's COVID-19 protocols allow.

Director Reimer announced that the next meeting of this safety committee was changed to Thursday, April 29, 2021. Trustee Damstrom asked about feedback from employees in relation to fatigue with working through this pandemic. Director Reimer replied that the staff in the schools are tired. Chair Lento expressed that the expectation of staff doing more is unreasonable. We need to keep putting pressure on our staff to produce. Trustee Bellina replied that after almost one and a half years of this pandemic, we are coping but very difficult on everyone.

Trustee McPhee commented that normally when we hit a roadblock and work through it, we would come together and celebrate. We do not have that opportunity right now nor the opportunity to give a physical thank you to people with a pat on the back or a handshake. We should keep a tally on how to thank people when we are able to. Trustee Turner commented that with the next two months being so busy she is going to think only about what is needed, not wanted.

A letter of support and thank you to the staff has been sent. A suggestion was brought up to bring forward a discussion to a Board meeting on ways we could celebrate the hard work of our employees for the end of the year.

7.2 Finance Report

Secretary Treasurer Rice indicated that we are right on track with spending as typically if we had three months remaining of the school year, we would be at about 30%.

8. ADJOURNMENT



Thank you to the students who love coming to school ready to learn each day and where they make connections with their peers and adults; this is so important for our students in these times.


Thank you to the Aboriginal Education Support Workers, Youth Care Workers and Education Assistants who find ways to support our children when they need it most.

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






Ready, Set, Learn is an initiative that recognizes that families need positive connections with the school system and community agencies that provide relevant resources and information. All public elementary schools in Southeast Kootenay School District will be offering an opportunity for all three to five year olds to connect with their neighbourhood school (children born in 2016, 2017 & 2018 (who have turned three by <mark>the date of the RSL event</mark>). This event is a partnership between the province, the district, and the early childhood teachers in Cranbrook, Fernie, Sparwood, Jaffray, and Elkford.

Each school held their own specific Ready, Set, Learn events over the months of April and May, <mark>each following COV</mark>ID protocols. Parents and caregivers receiv<mark>ed</mark> helpful tips for supporting their preschooler's learning and development. They were also given information about services available in their communities.



"Growing Innovation in Rural Sites of Learning was conceptualized in 2011 by the Rural Education Advisory Committee (REA) and is founded on the assumption that rural schools and communities are both the sites of, and benefit greatly from, innovation. In designing the initiative, the REA defined innovation as a "unique local response to a local need, problem or interest". The REA, which includes participants from school districts, BC

universities and the Ministry of Education, is delighted to support and promote your innovations. To date, the initiative has supported numerous projects which reflect the diversity across our communities and schools in rural BC."

Drum circles can work well with those uncomfortable expressing themselves in a second language such as French and plays a role in music classrooms as well.



Ozobots Evo - Coding with Lines - EIDES Kindergarten

Lego Coding Express - Coding with Colors

Kindergarten students from EIDES had opportunities to express their creativity and imagination at the Design Lab. They coded trains to make then stop, go, turn on a light and make a sound using the new Lego Coding Express kits. They also learned how to control a robot by drawing lines for the robot to follow. Ms. Green's class drew a map of Fernie for the Ozobot to travel through. One group included a drawing of a chairlift for the Ozobot to reach the top of the mountain.









Makey and Scratch Video Games

Ms. McMullan's Grade 5 class at Rocky Mountain Elementary, under the guidance of teacher librarian Ms. Hansen, designed and programmed a video game using the Scratch coding platform. The game took a few weeks to code and design. After the games were completed, students created a game controller using Makey Makeys and conductive materials to use with their game. Some groups made buttons out of Play Doh and a few students used fruit to control their game.

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Ozobot Evo at Rocky Mountain and FJ Mitchell

Ms. Stremecki's Grade 2 class at Rocky Mountain Elementary had an introductory session on Ozocode coding. Each group drew a map of Elkford with at least 3 places. At each place on the map, they programmed the Ozobot to perform a specific function such as spinning, driving zig zag, backwards, and more.

Ms. Schultz's grade 3 and 4 class at Frank J Mitchell learned how to program an

Ozobot using lines and colored patterns. The next day they listened to a reading of "Creepy Carrots" and coded their bots to drive in sequence to each part of the story using a story map. Students then used the Ozocode to program the Evo bots to follow the perimeter of the continent using lines and colored patterns.





3D Printing Fernie Secondary and Frank J Mitchell

Mr. Preston's grade 11 IT class designed parts and components of various objects of their choosing using the Tinkercad platform. Mr. Preston sent the prints to the FLC design lab for printing. Students learned about scale, proportion, dimensions, and work planes. Students will be given the completed prints to assemble and assess the accuracy of their measurements and tolerances.

Mrs. Chiasson's Grade 4 class learned about measurement, dimensions, proportion, estimating and scale when they designed bubble wands in Tinkercad. They uploaded their completed design to a shared One Drive folder for printing at the FLC design lab. They also visited the design lab for a day of Lego Wedo robotics and were able to pick up their 3D printed wands. Some tested out their wands and many were successful!



Advanced Agriculture

Students at Parkland were treated to some cricket cupcakes. The students learned how to use a set of Microbits and Climate Action Kit circuit boards to water plants and feed crickets. They learned how to program pumps and designed concept irrigations systems that were able to run autonomously. They let the systems run for a few weeks, harvesting the greens along the way. Once the crickets had grown a bit, they put them in the freezer, an ethical way of putting them to sleep, and then used them to make cupcakes. Yum!



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The Fourth Little Pig Built His House Out of Cardboard

Grade 1 students at TM Roberts Elementary put on a play earlier this year about "Les Trois Petits Cochons". When it came time to decide on a design project, it was easy to choose a cardboard house building challenge.

The students used the Make-Do kits and cardboard to build houses that wouldn't blow over in the howling wind of the Big Bad Wolf, a powerful fan. Make-Do kits contain kid friendly tools like screwdrivers, plastic screws and safety saws that are made for building with cardboard. Many of the designs survived the wind test while a few toppled over. Everyone had a blast chanting and watching everyone's designs being built and tested. Check out the video!

Wood Shop at Jaffray School

Mr. Fennema worked with his Grade 7 and 8 students on drafting plans for building boxes. The students started by making their own two perspective drafted plans then completed the boxes from the plans they created.

The students participated in a STEM activity where they designed 2 dimensional representations of a favourite creature and then converted it back to a 3-dimensional figure using simple shapes and going through the engineering design process.

CBT Basin Plays School Grants

Through the Columbia Basin Trust (CBT) Basin PLAYS Schools grant, schools can apply for up to \$2,500 to provide opportunities for students to explore and experience physical activities and sports in their communities. This could include active outdoor field trips, community sport and active leisure programs, and Indigenous traditional teachings and games. Many of our schools applied for and received this grant again this year.

Jaffray Elementary Junior Secondary School applied for and received grant money. A portion of this grant money was used to allow their secondary students to go to the community fitness centre and golf course. Pictures shown are from their visit to the fitness centre in the fall prior to when they had to wear masks in their cohorts. In May and June, they will visit the local golf course.





On March 4, the Outdoor Education class at Sparwood Secondary School cross-country skied to the Montane Hut in Fernie utilizing funds we received from the CBT plays grant. The trip was the culmination of their nutritional unit and involved meal planning, prepping, and determining the nutritional needs of each individual on such an excursion. While at the hut, the students took part in team building activities and worked on their leadership skills. The students pushed their boundaries, successfully accomplishing the 8km loop and had a fantastic time doing so!

A Year of COVID-19: Taking Stock and Looking Forward




Human Resources is pleased to bring a number of webinars to our employees via ZOOM and facilitated by our EFAP provider FSEAP. Starting May 5 employees will be able to access the first of 3 sessions "A Year of COVID-19: Taking Stock and Looking Forward" This one hour session supports participants to reflect back on pandemic experiences over the last year identifying challenges overcome, skills developed and silver linings. The workshop will also take a look ahead at how to cope with the next phase, what ways we could reconnect, and what are some practical tools to consolidate experiences and move forward guided by

core values. In addition, the facilitator will discuss best practices to maintain balance during

transitions and build capacity for post-traumatic growth and resilience.

Watch your emails for two future webinars being offered:

Empowering the Compassionate Self: Having compassion for the self and others has profound effects on our mental health and our ability to cope with difficult situations. In our work or at home, being able to see through an empathic and compassionate lens allows for a more successful interaction for all. Transforming our view increases understanding and raises awareness of ourselves and others' unique



situations. It allows for calmer and more objective decisions and for more meaningful positive communication and interpersonal relationships. This session will discuss how to approach interactions from a position of compassion. Attendees will gain a deeper understanding on how to move from emotional defensive reactions to make use of their most potent tools for responding to difficult interactions, which is compassion and empathy. Furthermore, the session will offer techniques that attendees can use for regulating their emotions and communicating more positively.

Stress and Anxiety Management: This session provides attendees with a deeper understanding of anxiety and warning signs of stress and compassion fatigue. The facilitator will explain why experiencing anxiety and stress are normal in certain situations, and discuss techniques and tools that attendees can use to cope with their anxiety. This session also goes into the importance of self-care and how to expand personal self-care practices.

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Cranbrook's Irene Bischler to receive BC Government's Medal of Good Citizenship

Irene Bischler has been described as one of the most compassionate, selfless and empathetic people who has ever worked at Cranbrook's Amy Woodland Elementary School. Irene is the first person in the building every morning. She sets up the breakfast club for the school, feeding 30 to 40 kids every morning and greets kids who may not have otherwise been fed or had a positive interaction that day. She has made connections with restaurants, service groups, grocery stores and other community members and gathers donations on her own time to ensure the breakfast club runs smoothly.

After breakfast Irene starts social emotional support groups where kids cook, do carpentry, sew, decorate cakes and cookies, quilt blankets and dozens of other activities. She supports teachers in classrooms and often takes kids into the community for activities. Her goal each day is to ensure kids are happy, emotionally regulated

and connected to the school community. Irene has supported every level of athlete through her power skating and figure skating coaching. She has given respite care to kids to help out families in crisis.

Irene has also worked with individuals with special needs for many years. She mentors young teachers and education assistants and has worked with students in an alternate program. Irene is the local president of the CUPE Union and is constantly working to ensure her members are supported despite the high stress situations they find themselves working in.

Irene's mission is to ensure the people around her have a better day, greater opportunity, feel empowered and valued and have a deeper purposeful connection with their community. The lives of students, staff, families and coworkers are richer and more fulfilling due to her endless energy and efforts. Way to go Irene!


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Gordon Terrace Elementary School Grade 1/2 class have been working hard on their Spool Knitting Projects.
