1. COMMENCEMENT OF MEETING

1.1 Call to Order

I want to acknowledge that we have gathered here in the Homelands of the Ktunaxa people.

The Advocacy/Education Committee Meeting of October 28, 2019 was called to order at 9:33 a.m. by Co-Chair Whalen.

2. PRESENTATIONS

2.1 East Kootenay Adolescent Substance Use Survey Results - Silke Yardley

Superintendent Yardley reviewed the East Kootenay Adolescent Substance Use Survey results with Trustees. Concerns were outlined as well as areas that have improved compared to previous reports. The discussion included:

- good sample size 73% of our students participated
- tobacco use amongst adolescents going down but vaping is on the rise
- surprised at the 20% increase of lifetime substance use for selected grades
- concerned about rates by gender for lifetime rates of substance use; two-spirited rates are much higher
- Aboriginal use rates Director Tichauer will be sharing this information with his staff
- what we are doing is working somewhat, but in some areas the statistics are still too high
- need more education around drinking and driving
- lots of resources have been sent to schools and we currently have programs in our schools to help educate; need to educate parents
- we have created a new policy and signage which will be ready for schools within two weeks
- SD5 rates are slightly lower than regional rates
- discussion around vaping detectors at Provincial Council meeting

More research will be done and brought back to future meeting.

2.2 CHEQ Data - Diane Casault

Director Casault presented a summary of the findings of the Cheq Data report to the Committee. The full district report goes more in depth and every school gets their own report. Kindergarten teachers receive this data as well. This data will help us figure out how we can make it better for the students coming into kindergarten. The snapshot shows 75% completion rate by parents. We would like this percentage to be higher. This is our third year doing this survey which gives us good comparison data. A discussion took place on the nutrition and sleep results and what we are doing as a district to support this. Two events will be organized, one in Cranbrook and one in the Elk Valley to discuss the Cheq report findings which is scheduled to be released on November 1, 2019. Director Casault will share with district management and schools. It will be interesting to see the correlation between the Cheq Report findings and the EDI.

3. ITEMS FORWARDED FROM PREVIOUS MEETING

3.1 School Bus Safety Update - Alan Rice

Information was presented by Secretary-Treasurer Alan Rice on seat belt use on busses. Information was received by Bill Graham who is currently doing work for us on this issue with provincial and national safety boards. The information included:

- historical studies of bus accidents say the outcome would not have changed if seat belts were used; could have actually caused more damage
- Statistics show more accidents occur when students are pedestrians
- all SD5's busses are flat nose busses which provides a larger range of view
- if you purchase a bus with seat belts it is mandatory for students to wear them
- bus drivers would be responsible to ensure students wear them; some districts hire someone to monitor
- cost of retrofitting is approximately \$30-40K per bus
- financially/logistically and safety wise it might not be the best thing to do
- discussion arose regarding recent Hosmer accident –a road nearby was an alternative stop but in winter this will not work due to unplowed roads; no other option at this point unless we cancel this stop
- Mr. Rice will research the cost of new busses with seat belts installed
- possibly look at routes where we might want to have students in seatbelts i.e., on the highway; safety has to trump everything else
- distractions on busses from kids not in seats is another issue
- need to ask the Ministry of Education for their guidance on this issue and if there are any current guidelines or reports
- · report back at future meeting

The meeting on October 30 was cancelled due to no bussing available. The next meeting will be held after Christmas.

Trustee Turner reported:

DPAC is in jeopardy of being disbanded unless they have a chair and a vice-chair come forward and greater attendance and support from parents. A discussion took place on how to support DPAC and it was decided to form a working group to meet with Tara McKee and Lee Salvador to come up with ideas on how to increase participation in both PACs and DPAC. Trustee Turner will reach out to DPAC to offer support and to set up a meeting with Trustees and Superintendent Yardley. In the meantime it was suggested to look to BCCPAC for resources. Trustee Whalen will find a survey on DPAC that was done at least 5 years ago which could help start the process.

Director of Student Learning and Innovation, Diane Casault, updated the Student Services Committee ("the Committee") on the status of the Individual Education Plans ("IEP") for the 2019/2020 academic year. Mrs. Casault reported that all IEP's will be finalized between mid-November and the first week of December. A review of the finalized IEP's will occur during the first week of December.

District Principal of Student Services, Darcy Verbeurgt, informed the Committee that funding for IEP Writing has been communicated to all schools. Schools are aware of timing and funding available. The 2019/2020 amount for the School Based Team, IEP and Consultation Meeting fund is \$60,425. The amount available for IEP Writing is \$58,981. Mr. Verbeurgt explained that this equates to 140.4 days of release time for the purpose of IEP writing.

Mrs. Casault also gave a brief report on the Principal/Vice Principal Meeting on Thursday, October 24 in Fernie. The focus of this meeting was on Student Services and the School Administrator's role in supporting the essential services and supports for students.

Superintendent Silke Yardley thanked Mr. Verbeurgt and Maggie Lindsay-Tadey for the informative presentation at the Principal/Vice Principal Meeting on October 24

Further matters regarding new students from outside of the District registering with designations and active IEP's were discussed. In addition, the process of quickly assessing new students was briefly explained by Mr. Verbeurgt.

Chairperson Lento reiterated the importance of meeting the needs of the students in our School District as quickly as possible.

2.2 Placement of Educational Assistants Update

Discussion regarding the ongoing process of hiring Education Assistants. School District 5 has increased the number of Education Assistants from 100 to 153 positions over the last several years.

Director of Instruction, Human Resources, Brent Reimer, explained that these 153 positions are all filled or in the process of being filled. This has left the pool of casual Education Assistants (qualified and unqualified) very small.

Further discussion regarding the placement of Education Assistants to be held in Finance Operations Meeting (under separate Minutes).

2.3 Social Emotional Learning Centre ("SELC") Update

Mrs. Casault distributed DRAFT pamphlets on the Social Emotional Learning Centre and gave a brief update on logistics and timeline for the SELC:

- The SELC Team met with staff at TM Roberts, Steeples and Highlands
- The SELC Team will be going into classrooms the first week of November
- The Education Assistant was hired and started on October 28
- The student referral form is being used in Working Draft
- Mr. Verbeurgt is working on a parental permission form
- Students start at the Centre on November 12
- Intense 14 week program until spring break
- The possibility of a shortened version after spring break for Grade 3 students

2.4 Laurie Middle School Update

Trustee Johns discussed the newspaper article in the <u>Cranbrook Townsman</u> on Friday, October 25. Trustee Johns reminded the Committee that it is important to make sure to advocate for the public education system and to make sure positive information is available to the public.

Minutes from the previous meeting were reviewed and discussed. Mrs. Casault noted that the administration and staff need time to work on the new Mission and Vision Statements.

This topic will be an ongoing agenda item for the Committee.

Further discussion regarding Laurie Middle School to be held in In Camera Meeting.

3. CORRESPONDENCE AND/OR NEW ITEMS

3.1 School Base Funding Allocation Discussion

Secretary-Treasurer Alan Rice briefly reviewed the Special Education funding increase due to the number of students with complex learning needs in the District. The funding has increased from \$8.7 million to \$9.6 million for the 2019/2020 Academic Year.

Trustee Johns requested details on the \$325 student allocation to meet the needs of students for reporting in an Executive Summary to the Select Standing Committee on Thursday, October 31.

School Base Funding Allocation to be further discussed in Finance Operations meeting.

4. INFORMATION ITEMS

CDTA President, Shelley Balfour, requested that the Board of Education consider including Student Services Teachers under Article B.27 - Positions of Special Responsibility - to honour the time and effort they put in both before and during the school year by providing them with the 5 days in lieu of their time in the summer which is equivalent to what the School Counselors receive under this Article.

5. ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 11:56 a.m.

of the work.



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

A Double Dose of Intermediate Math: Extended Learning Rounds with Carole Fullerton

Day One:

On October 29th, Carole previewed a rich intermediate math lesson exploring the big math ideas to be presented in the classroom. Teacher participants accompanied Carole in the classroom, observed students while they worked and made notes about their responses to questions and the tasks at hand. A debrief of the lesson followed and plans made for follow-up.

In the afternoon of the same day, teacher participants will have the chance to repeat this lesson cycle in a second classroom at Isabell Dicken Elementary - previewing the lesson, observing students and then debriefing the lesson together.

Day Two:

On October 30th, teachers returned for day 2 of this lesson cycle. Carole built on the previous day's learning in both the morning and afternoon classes and modelled strategies to take the math further for all students. Two more demonstration lessons took place and instructional strategies were shared.

Thirty seven new laptops for the Aboriginal Education department arrived and will be deployed in the next few weeks.


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EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION

C2C – Classrooms to Communities Conference in Vancouver October 25-26

Place-Based Learning is a core foundation of our curriculum in B.C. The focus of this conference was to help educators connect classroom and community through a focus on people, place and planet. Encouraging participants to discover the value of place and community, wherever they live, teach and learn and to inspire more promising practices and transformative learning in our schools and communities. Joe Pierre and Michelle Sam represented SD5 and Ktunaxa very well. Joe Pierre was very well received as a storyteller presenter at the conference. Michele Sam facilitated a dialogue focused on environmental education and Indigenous people knowledge with the new career education curriculum.

IBM K-12 EDUCATION

Jennifer Roberts attended the IBM K-12 Education Briefing in Cambridge Massachusetts. The theme of this professional devleopment session will revolve around innovation and emerging technologies "Preparing for the Future Workforce".

Students in Mrs. King's Environmental Science 11 at ESS have been studying various ecosystems. As part of a larger project, they used the Oculus Quest VR to "experience" their chosen place. One group studying Chernobyl were able to "tour" the site safely. The group stated that after "touring" Chernobyl, it made them more curious about what happened there and they would like to visit it in person. Other groups toured a rainforest, a desert and other diverse ecosystems.

Voice to Text


Multiple students at Highlands, among other schools, are using new reading and writing tools to access learning. Speech to text allows students to have their words typed out for them. Text to speech has the computer read specific texts back to them whether it's their own writing, something on the internet or even a picture of a printout. These tools continue to be refined and improved and are at the point that students are able to access them in almost any situation and on multiple devices.

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ADVOCACY

HR has been busy recruiting CUPE employees including Education Assistants, Noon Hour Supervisors, Bus Drivers, Custodians and Clerical support over the past several months.

We have partnered with Kootenay Employment Services and their Program Facilitator in Cranbrook to introduce the many job opportunities that School District 5 can offer. To date HR has attended two discussion sessions (workshops) with prospective job searchers at Kootenay Employment Services in Cranbrook. On September 27, 2019, we met with a group of participants 55+, this was a small group of people with a wide variety of skills. The time was well received by all applicants and the program facilitator with many expressing a desire to apply for casual work with the district.



On October 23, 2019 HR had an information table at the Elk Valley Job Fair held at the Fernie Community Center from 12 pm – 3pm. This is the second time we have attended a job fair in the Elk Valley, the first was an SD5 only job fair that was hosted at the Work BC Center in June 2019. We advertised our attendance in the Elk Valley Job Fair in all the school newsletters throughout the Elk Valley as well as the local newspaper. This advertising was done independently of the advertising that Work BC has put into the Job Fair. We had a good turnout with many interested applicants, interviews were conducted and new employees were hired.

Our next hiring fair is December 5, 2019 at the Elkford Public Library. Any interested applicants are encouraged to attend.

Human Resources will continue to promote School District No. 5 (Southeast Kootenay) as a great place to live and work as opportunities arise around our district.


