4.3 Framework for Enhancing Student Learning (FESL) (Items determined by Superintendent)

4.3.1 Rainbow and Process - Jane Nixon, Laurel Giesbrecht, Gail Rousseau and Silke Yardley

Superintendent Yardley gave a brief outline of the process behind the Framework of Student Learning (FESL) Rainbow of opportunities and thanked the team – Jane Nixon, Laurel Giesbrecht and Gail Rousseau who, behind the scenes, created the process. There will be three separate intake opportunities, now, another in November and again in February. Lots of great work has been done to get to where we are today and is very helpful to have now everything in one place.

Superintendent Yardley introduced Jane Nixon, Executive Assistant, on behalf of the team, who went through a power point describing the process in more detail. Jane mentioned this power point has also been presented to the principals/vice-principals at their last meeting. A discussion on how and when to advertise the many different learning opportunities took place. Superintendent Yardley clarified how individual teachers can make individual choices for professional learning which are all tied to the FESL. This will also include in-service for any district mandated projects/programs.

4.3.2 Literacy Update - Erin Jones

Erin Jones, District Literacy Coordinator, outlined the District Strategic Literacy Plan ("The Plan") for the 2021/2022 school year in response to our Framework for Enhancing Student Learning (FESL).

The Plan's highlights included:

- focussing on grade 2 literacy
- implementing a common benchmark reading assessment
- figuring out what teachers need to support their students; not about gathering data
- creating an awareness for systems and support
- will be using Fountas & Pinell and/or PM Benchmarks
- in-service sessions for Grade 2 teachers in both Elk Valley and Cranbrook throughout the year; will look at in-service for Grade 3 teachers next year
- focussing on whole school culture working together to support all needs of learners in classrooms
- projects starting on November 1st the Why? December 1st the How? And February 10 – What's Next?

- building bridges across the district
- also offering after school sessions as well as out of district sessions for supporting at risk learners

2. BUSINESS ARISING FROM PREVIOUS MINUTES

2.1 Social Emotional Learning Centre (SELC) Update

Teacher, Jessica Bartraw, has been getting oriented as to the program before with the previous classroom teacher. She has been Incorporating her own knowledge into the program. We gave her a 3-4 week period to acclimate and develop the program. We have moved the program from a start at TM Roberts Elementary School (TMRES) to starting at Highlands Elementary School (HES) as there are lots of materials stored there and being resident in a building would be a good during start up. TMRES will be the programs next stop and Steeples Elementary School (SES) following that, depending on what comes up. We are working on universal and targeted instruction and supports with Social Emotional Learning with a focus on capacity building within the school. The program has worked best with working collaboratively in the school with staff on site. We will be using some bussing back to the Highlands SELC classroom in the future perhaps a couple times a week with Education Assistant (EA)/Youth Care Worker (YCW) support. We can get deeper into the program with the supplies housed at HES.

2.2 Speech Language Pathologist (SLP) Redistribution

The realignment of SLPs turned out to be complex and services will need to be reduced. We budgeted for 6.2 FTE and we currently have only 4.4 FTE, though we are actively recruiting. As of November 1, schools will receive between 50-85% of their 6.2 FTE allotment. We will see a net overall 3-5 hours in additional travel to provide services to other communities. This will be in effect until January 31, 2021. Hopefully we will need to look at a new redistribution at that time.

We will be supporting some schools more heavily over the next couple of months. Amy Woodland Elementary School (AWES) and SES will be more heavily serviced over the next 3 months as they haven't had support since May. With 70% less staffing, there will be fewer core responsibilities for the SLPs. They will also service the devices and systems for kids that are non-verbal. SLPs will stop supporting where there are other staff that have the skills to complete such as literacy and sound connections. Student Services Teacher's (SSTs) will take responsibility for simple picture symbol reproduction and common social stories.

We currently have 5 Speech Language Assistants (SLAs) that are specialized Education Assistants (EAs). We have talked about hiring CUPE staff to support SLPs. There are currently EAs/YCWs who have done the SLA role in the past. We understand that we have other qualified people who are living in the East Kootenay's that we hope to attract to do the work. We're not at the best hiring time right now, but hopefully we can get there.

There is continued difficulty in recruiting qualified people. At one time we were quite competitive in attracting SLPs. We do provide them with a pretty good professional development allotment, but we may not be competitive enough overall. We need to continue to post those positions and scrap anything that says temporary even if it's a 0.5. The contracts must have continuity and we need to be competitive. We need to at least meet the beginning wages and benefits of other rural areas. Recruitment and retention is difficult in all workplaces including in the private sector. It really is all about salaries and the cost of living. The BC Public School Employers' Association have regional scales for Speech Language Pathologists – five steps ranging from \$83,950 to a max of \$104,000. Perhaps the pay scale is a factor. The teacher's union has offered ideas such as paying off student loans after 3 years of service, assistance with housing, buying houses in Elkford and renting them out, etc.

4.1 School Psychology Assessment update

Purpose of School Psychologists has been laid out as well as the purpose of assessment. A full time School Psychologist can complete 50-70 assessments each year. The bottom line is that our worklist of assessments includes 19 assessments in progress with 125 referrals. There was a significant increase in referrals between January to mid-February 2021. If we are to use the completion ratio for the 10-month workload turnaround, we would need about 1.9 FTE School Psychologists to meet this requirement this academic year. Good news is that we've reviewed our budgets and can put an additional 0.3 FTE out to staff. This would bring us up to a 1.8 FTE. This can be done within our current budget.

In the long run, we need to determine where we need to be with School Psychologists FTE. The School Psychologists of BC Association recommend a ratio of 1.0 per 2500 students. Our programming depends on these assessments for educational programming. Of those assessments that are required, Student Services Teachers complete the

achievement assessments and psycho-cognitive assessments must be completed by a School Psychologist. Trustee Johns commented, we can't be the only school that is experiencing a shortfall in this area. We must determine how we advocate for what we need in the future.




Food is Culture

Reading and Writing with AI

Students at many schools were introduced to a set of applications to support their reading and writing. **Seeing AI** is an app that can scan and read everything from short text, scenes, currency, and even people's emotions in just a few short seconds. Microsoft has made their voice to text and text to voice applications even more reliable and easier to access. Multiple classes at Amy Woodland Elementary School were trained how to use Dictate and Immersive Reader to support their writing. The computer voices seem to be getting more and more friendly every day. All these tools are available on our computers and iPads and are supported by the Transformative Learning Team.

Teachers from multiple schools in Cranbrook and the Elk Valley got together for the first of many Framework for Enhancing Student Learning sessions surrounding the topic of Digital Literacy. They explored the diversity of this topic and resources that will help students build social and technical skills when working with digital mediums. This project is geared towards Grade 4 teachers and teacher librarians in the district. The goal of the project is building and following digital literacy skills of these Grade 4 students over the next few years.









Students in Ms. Lloyd's Media Design class at Fernie Secondary School assembled a drone obstacle course and tried their hand at piloting a drone. Students learned that it is harder than it looks! Under strict safety precautions, some students had the opportunity to fly the more advanced DJI drone inside of Traynor Hall. Students are showing a keen interest in learning more about drone technology.





VR Inquiry Project Environmental Education

Ms. Demer's students at Kootenay Discovery School have shown a keen interest in learning more about animals and their habitats. Students will be participating in a virtual reality inquiry project where they will explore different animal habitats and biomes using the Oculus Quest 2 headsets and the Wander app. For examples, students will view chimpanzees in Africa, penguins in Antarctica, and go diving in the Red Sea to view colorful coral reefs and fish.

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Jaffray Shutterbugs - Students from Jaffray Elementary Junior Secondary School learned how to use the growing set of DSLR cameras at their school. After multiple learning sessions, they took a trip to Fort Steele to capture the views, details and history of the area. Back at school, they learned how to organize and edit their photos in Adobe Lightroom. The final event was a lighthearted photo contest with prizes going to different categories such as best landscape, portrait, perspective, to name a few. There were also prizes for awkward and funny photos as well as the best accidentally amazing photo which went to a photo of a girl on a swing whose outfit colours matched the paint and decor of the surrounding Fort Steel Heritage Town perfectly.



Book Creator and Story Studio at Steeples - Students at Steeples used eBooks to document their learning and reflections. Students explored design, layout, and an introduction to being a digital citizen. The students also used hands-on manipulatives to explore settings. They created and designed a setting and then introduced a character.




